## Grade 2 – At Home Learning – Week 3 - April 20 – 24 – Do <u>any 3</u> in a row for the week.

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<ul> <li>Write/Art Work/Read – Taking Care Of The Earth <ul> <li>Make a book about ways to help the earth.</li> <li>Get 2 pieces of paper, put them together and fold them in half.</li> <li>Make up your own title for the cover and draw a picture to go with it. Remember to put your name as the author and illustrator.</li> <li>Tell one thing that people can do to help the earth on each page. Think of ways to reduce, reuse, recycle and repair.</li> <li>Draw a picture for each page. Add good details.</li> <li>Read your book to someone at home.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Math - Skip Counting/Exercising <ul> <li>Count by 1s to 75 while you walk up and down your driveway.</li> <li>Count by 10s starting at 1 and going to 101, while you stretch to the sky each time. (Can you count higher?)</li> <li>Count backwards by 5s from 50, while hop up and down the driveway.</li> <li>Count by 5s to 100 while you do jumping jacks.</li> <li>Count by 2s to 60 while you skip on the spot, or use a skipping rope.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Build/Draw/Write – Get Your Family To Help!</li> <li>Mission – Make or build something out of recycled/reused materials that you could use at home.</li> <li>Discuss with your family things that you need for inside or outside.</li> <li>What could you make that would be useful with the materials you have at home? Be creative!</li> <li>Draw a picture of what you made.</li> <li>How many? – Use tally marks to keep track of the number of items you use.</li> <li>Then write about it. What did you make? What did you use? How did you make it?</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>Math - Card Game - Play with your family.</li> <li>10 Up - Should recognize quickly where the number goes.</li> <li>Each player gets 10 cards. Place the cards face down, like a 10 frame - 5 in one row, 5 underneath.</li> <li>Place the rest of the cards face down in a pile.</li> <li>Player who goes first will take the top card. If it is an A-1 to 10, they will put it in the right place on the 10 frame. Flip over the card in that spot, you keep playing until you get a face card or already have the card turned up.</li> <li>Cards that can't be used go in the discard pile. On your turn, you can take the top card in the discard pile if you need it, if not draw a card.</li> <li>Face cards you miss a turn or if you flip over a card you already have.</li> <li>First person to flip over all 10 cards wins!</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Clean Up Time! - Walk With Your Family</li> <li>Earth Day is on April 22<sup>nd</sup>. If it is a nice day, this would be a great time to get outside, enjoy some fresh air and take care of our earth.</li> <li>With your family you can make a plan and start with your own yard. Pick up any things that were left behind after the winter and were covered by the snow.</li> <li>Once you are done here, go out for a walk and bring along a bag, so you can pick up some garbage or trash you see along the way. Every little bit helps! Make sure to wear gloves or mittens!</li> <li>Write a few sentences about what you did and draw a picture to go with it.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Recycled Works Of Art- Do with your family</li> <li>Time to be creative!</li> <li>Since we are celebrating Earth Day this week, your mission is to create a piece of art using only recycled material. Try not to use anything new!</li> <li>Create anything you would like: picture, collage, sign, sculpture etc.</li> <li>You could use empty boxes, paper towel or toilet paper rolls, newspaper, caps, covers, the other side of a piece of paper. See what you have around the house.</li> <li>You will be creating something beautiful and helping the earth at the same time.</li> <li>When you are done share it with your family and then display it somewhere in your house.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>Story Time – Read To Me, I'll Read To You</li> <li>Share a book with someone at home.</li> <li>Choose a non-fiction story or book. Something with real facts and information. You might find something about Earth Day.</li> <li>If you don't have something at home, check the Scholastic site or National Geographic Kids.</li> <li>After reading, discuss the information. What things you already knew and new facts you learned.</li> <li>Do you like non-fiction books? Why or why not?</li> <li>Draw a detailed picture of something new that you learned from the story.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Write/Draw – Family Time <ul> <li>With your family make a list of 5 things that you can do at home every day to help take care of the earth.</li> <li>Remember the 4R's: Reduce, Reuse, Recycle and Repair.</li> <li>Draw a little picture beside each thing.</li> <li>Have everyone in the family sign their name to the sheet.</li> <li>Put it up on the fridge as a reminder of the things you can do to help.</li> <li>Even a small thing makes a difference.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Math – Problem Solving <ul> <li>Can you figure out the answer?</li> </ul> </li> <li>Ms. Sullivan's class picked up 25 pieces of trash. Ms.</li> <li>Moar's class picked up 22 pieces of trash. How much trash did they pick up all together?</li> <li>Use base 10 blocks to help. Draw a picture of the 10s and 1s for each number. (Rods and units). Then add them together to get your answer.</li> <li>Tell someone at home how you got your answer. What strategies did you use?</li> <li>Now make up and write down your own math problem for someone at home to solve.</li> </ul>
